### **Tech Support Scams**

### Here's how they work:

You get a pop-up or other urgent message from someone saying your computer is infected. It might seem like the message comes from a well-known company like Microsoft or Apple, or maybe your internet service provider. It tells you there are viruses or other malware on your computer. It says you have to call a number or risk losing your personal data. But is this threat - or their problem - real? Judging by reports to the Federal Trade Commission, no. These are scammers who want to sell you useless services, steal your credit card number, or get access to your computer to install malware, which could then let them see everything on your computer.

### Here's what you can do:

- Stop. Don't call a phone number or click a link. Don't send money, give your credit card number, or give control of your computer to anyone who contacts you.
- 2. Pass this information on to a friend. You might know these popups are fake, but chances are you know someone who doesn't.

### MANCHESTER COORDINATING COUNCIL

The MCC monthly meeting was held on April 22, 2024, at Village 5 Clubhouse, Schoolhouse Rd, Whiting, NJ.

Guest speaker Britta Forsberg, Executive Director of Save Barnegat Bay, was introduced.

Currently owned by BASF, the former Ciba-Geigy site is on over a thousand acres in Ocean County, with an entrance on SR37 at St. Catherine's Drive and another on Cardinal Drive in Toms River.

From 1952 to 1996, the plant manufactured dyes, pigments, resins, and epoxy additives.

The US EPA officially designated the land contaminated by hazardous materials and as a priority cleanup, or a federal Superfund in 1983.

The damage was further identified the following year, when the pipe to the Atlantic Ocean broke, creating a sinkhole around the Ocean County Mall, exposing the extent of the contamination damage to the land and groundwater aguifer for all to see.

Britta Forsberg of Save Barnegat Bay, a local non-profit organization formed to protect Barnegat Bay and its Watershed. Britta showed a short video, "CONfluence," which explained the latest challenge in the fight to identify and restore the natural resources that were damaged.

VP Councilman Jim Vicaro announced the present Police Chief of Manchester is retiring as of April 30. A new resolution was made at Manchester town hall for our new Police Chief, who will start duty on May 1.

A participant reported about the Manchester Senior Social program. Located at the EMS building in Manchester, the program offers opportunities such as lunch with Mayor Arace, a presentation on unclaimed property, safety programs, etc. It is funded by a Grant from Ocean County Commissioners. Stop in at the EMS building on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday.

The next meeting is June 24, 2024.

### **MINUTE**

### **Hello Residents of Crestwood Village 1!**

### Total Work Orders (past 30 days) = 256

Now that Spring has officially sprung, I am seeing lots of residents out and about. This time of year is for spring cleanups, in and around your units and I am sending this to help residents better understand the dos and don'ts related to some of these activities.

### **Yard Cleanups**

Residents are expected to maintain their properties. If raking leaves or pine needles, they must be bagged in brown paper leaf bags. Soil, branches, garbage are not permitted to be put in the bags. If the Maintenance workers come by and they feel these materials are in the bag, THEY WILL NOT PICKUP THE BAG(S). Leaf bags are to be brought out to the curb prior to 7:00 AM on all Thursdays, as this is Village 1's dedicated day for brush and bag removal. Speaking of brush, this must also be brought to the curb prior to pickup, in manageable piles. The brush is for branches and trimming, not for large trees or root balls.

Lawn bags are available through the Maintenance Department at a cost of \$5 for 5 bags, please call to schedule delivery.

### **Lawn Service**

We have a general idea when the mowers are coming, but inclement weather does affect their schedule quite a bit. It is important that you keep yards clean and mostly clear so they can efficiently perform the service they provide. If you have hired a separate lawn service to do your yards, then it is imperative that you place "DO NOT MOW" flags around the property, so the Village lawn service knows to skip your property. If you notice any damage or have any questions or concerns please contact the Maintenance Department so that we can investigate the claim and contact the appropriate people.

### Landscapers

If you are utilizing a landscaping company to maintain your lawns or properties, you must place flags around your property (pink – Do Not Mow flags) so the contracted Village mowers know to pass your property. If your landscapers are trimming or removing trees, they are required to take all their work debris with them. The Village will not pick up landscapers debris and trust me, it's pretty easy to tell the difference when a resident is cutting and trimming compared to a professional landscaper.

### **Sheds**

The Village does allow residents to purchase storage sheds for the property. There is a specific size that residents must adhere to and a permission request form is required for sheds. Please contact the Maintenance Department for more information.

### **Hoses & Spigots**

If you are in need of connecting your hose, please call the Maintenance Department. If you are looking to water around your units with your outside spigot and you notice there is no water or a reduced water flow, please contact the Maintenance Department. There is a possibility that the piping associated with the spigot suffered a failure or simply the water was turned off at the end of last season and just needs to be turned back on. If you do notice issues with the spigot, please do not continue to use as additional damages might occur. The Maintenance Department is replacing spigots, which are now 100% chargeable to you the resident, please call for current pricing.

### **Air Conditioning Units**

Central air conditioning residents are responsible for their air conditioning, service and any repairs. If you are installing a new central air conditioning system, the condensation drain lines are not permitted to deposit into the crawlspace and must be run to the exterior of the buildings. For those with wall units, please make sure your covers are removed prior to activating. Window units are not permitted anywhere in the Village. Please call the Maintenance Department if you need assistance in removing the covers.

### Trees

If you feel there is a dangerous tree in your area or a tree that is currently resting on your roofs, please contact the Maintenance Department so an inspection can be completed to determine if the trees meet the Village's criteria for removal.

### Dogs

Please clean up after your dogs while out on walks and dispose of it in your own garbage. If you walk your dog around your unit, you are expected to clean up after them immediately. The area outside of the 3' perimeter of your unit is considered common grounds and are used by several people and they should not be subjected to your dogs "land mines". Dogs are to be leashed at all times and should never be left unattended. Dog leads are not permitted. I see plenty of residents who have posted signs on the lawns regarding people cleaning up after their dogs, which means to me that people are not cleaning up after them.
